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

Water Savings Incentive Program (WaterSIP) Partnering through Grants to Conserve Our Water Resources

JANUARY 2009

The South Florida Water Management District is a regional, governmental agency that oversees the water resources in the southern half of the state. It is the oldest and largest of the state's five water management districts.

Our Mission is to manage and protect water resources of the region by balancing and improving water quality, flood control, natural systems, and water supply.

Meeting Growing Demands for Water

South Florida's unprecedented growth and development has presented water managers with bold challenges to provide water supplies for ever-increasing demands, while continuing to ensure our natural water resources are protected and preserved. The area's population is expected to reach over 7 million within the next decade, so every drop of water is a precious resource.


Recent water supply plans have concluded that historically used freshwater sources will not be sufficient to meet all future water needs of the region, therefore we must work together to conserve water and develop alternative sources of water supply. Water conservation and supply projects take the cooperation of many parties – water management districts, local governments, utilities, homeowners' associations – in fact, everyone who resides in or visits the area.

Water Conservation Initiatives

The South Florida Water Management District has developed a cost-sharing program to assist public and organizational entities with innovative technology-based water conservation projects that help reduce water use.

The initiative is nicknamed WaterSIP, for Water Savings Incentive Program. Projects funded through the program are non-capital in nature, meaning not part of a public water provider's or user's capital improvement program.

Types of projects funded have included automatic flushing devices for hydrants, pressure stabilization valves, indoor plumbing retrofits, large area irrigation controls, soil moisture technology, and rain shut-off devices for irrigation systems.

Funding and Application Process

The WaterSIP program is funded annually, with approval from the District's Governing Board. Entities seeking funding must be able to match at least 50% of the total costs for the project, either with matching funds or in-kind services unless the entity is a Rural Economic Development Initiative (REDI) community. Projects commence on October 1, 2009 and must be completed by August 28, 2010. Potential applicants would include cities, public utilities and water providers, homeowners' associations, schools and commercial facilities.

Applicants submit proposals in response to a grant solicitation posted on the District web site at www.sfwmd.gov. A selection committee consisting of Governing Board appointed members and District staff rank eligible projects based on selection criteria that include:

- Conservation efficiency (estimated number of gallons saved per year)
- Cost effectiveness
- Environmental and/or community benefits
- Innovation

Once the project is selected, ranked, and submitted to the Governing Board for approval, a dynamic partnership begins that is focused on preserving South Florida's future.

WaterSIP grants selected for implementation in fiscal year 2009 totaled \$1.03 million and will result in an estimated water savings of 550 million gallons of water a year. We invite you to apply for a grant in February 2009 for project funding in fiscal year 2009. And we encourage you to become a key player by helping us implement solutions for conserving our water resources.

Partnerships are the hallmark of water management district activities. Over the years, the role of water management has broadened and evolved into that of facilitator and implementer. As we move ahead to address long-term water needs, these partnerships will bring key players to the table to help develop solutions.
