July 4th fireworks will be more enjoyable if you choose to walk or hop to the beach!

The Town of Lauderdale-By-The-Sea has another fantastic Fourth of July event planned this year for residents and visitors, including a great community parade at **10AM**, a waterslide, music and fireworks show off the beach!

Commissioner Mark Brown, the Fourth of July Committee Chairman, said there will be a waterslide and refreshment tents in **El Prado Park** from **12 to 4PM**. **Love 94 Radio** will provide the music throughout the afternoon.

Kids and adults are encouraged to ride their bikes in the parade, which starts at **10AM** behind **Town Hall** on **Bougainville Drive**. To join in the fun, report to the staging area (See flyer on Page 6) behind Town Hall at **9AM**.

You don't need to ride the entire parade route. Children can stop when the parade reaches **El Prado**, where there will be ribbons and ice cream for the young participants.

The fireworks will be launched off the beach at **9PM** near El Prado Park.

If you want to grab something to eat or drink, Commissioner Brown is encouraging residents and visitors to patronize the many restaurants and shops downtown.

Traffic Alert

Broward Sheriff's Office Lt. Thomas Palmer said vehicle traffic on **State Road A1A** will be jammed for at least one hour after the fireworks show ends, since there will also be motorists from **Fort Lauderdale** and **Pompano Beach** traveling on A1A towards **Commercial Boulevard**.

"Expect heavy traffic delays," he warned. BSO anticipates closing **Anglin's Square** to

Town sees large drop in crime rate

National Uniform Crime Rate statistics collected annually by the **FBI** indicate that crime in **Lauderdale-By-The-Sea** in **2013** dropped by **21.7 percent**, the third biggest decline among cities in Broward County.

The Town has the **sixth lowest crime rate** among all cities in Broward, just behind the small **Village of Sea Ranch**



Lakes, our closest municipal neighbor. **BSO Capt. Fred Wood** said our crime rate compares favorably with other cities, particularly since the rate is based on population per 100,000 residents, which puts us at a disadvantage because we

have one of the highest seasonal population increases of any city in Broward County. It is estimated the Town's population doubles to about **12,000** people in the winter, which is not reflected in the crime rate.

Wood said the Town also compared favorably to other small Florida coastal communities around the state, including **Sanibel, Cocoa Beach** and **St. Augustine Beach**.

The Town's crime clearance rate in 2013 was **24.8 percent**. Nine cities in Broward had a higher clearance rate than Lauderdale-By-The-Sea. Twenty cities had a lower clearance rate.

At a recent **Town Commission** meeting, **Mayor Scot Sasser** said he feels the Town's low crime rate is a reflection of its close working relationship with BSO.

"I'll pass that along to the troops," Wood said. "The credit goes to them."

Town Fire and EMS response times exceed national standards

The **Town of Lauderdale-By-The-Sea's** fire and emergency medical response times meet or exceed the accepted national standards.

American Medical Response's average response time per EMS call is **3:45 minutes**. According to the **National EMS Information System**, the national average is **9.3 minutes**.

The **Lauderdale-By-The-Sea Volunteer Fire Department's** average response time over the past 13 months (May 2013 to May 2014) is **3.81 minutes**. Response time is measured from the time the call is dispatched to arrival on the scene.

The **National Fire Protection Association** says a professional fire department should arrive at the scene within four minutes. For volunteer fire departments, the national standard is nine minutes.

KEEP YOUR HOME SAFE

The **Broward Sheriff's Office** says these precautions can help make your home safer and less attractive to burglars.

- ♦Be sure your outdoor lighting illuminates all entrances to your home or apartment.

- ♦Cut back shrubbery to discourage burglars



from hiding near window and doors.

- ♦Always keep windows and doors locked. Make certain your garage door is closed and locked.

- ♦Install a peephole in your front door so you can identify the visitor before opening your home.

- ♦Windows and sliding glass doors should be secured with auxiliary locks. Special door pins, available at home improvement stores, can prevent your sliding doors from being lifted off their tracks during a burglary.

- ♦Deadbolt locks should be used on all exterior doors (single or double cylinder with a minimum one inch throw is recommended).

- ♦Never hide or store keys or tools outside.

- ♦When you're going to be out-of-town for a while, let trusted friends and neighbors know.

- ♦Make your home appear occupied while you are away. Attach timers to lights and TVs; set them to turn on and off at different times.

- ♦Have your paper and mail held, or picked up by a trusted friend or neighbor.

- ♦Disconnect automatic garage door openers.

- ♦Open some of the drapes or blinds on your windows. During daytime hours, it gives the appearance someone is home. During the evening, lights inside the house also appear more visible.

Town receiving lots of favorable local publicity

The little **Town of Lauderdale-By-The-Sea** has appeared as a big blip on the media's radar screen in the past six months.

The Town has been the subject of numerous newspaper and magazine articles, including several about the **Commercial Boulevard Streetscape Projects** and the Town's ongoing efforts to preserve its **Miami Modern** (MiMo) architecture.


Fort Lauderdale Magazine, *Tropic Florida Living & Design Magazine*, *Curbed Miami*, *Quality Cities*, and the *South Florida Sun-Sentinel* all wrote about the streetscape project, which won an award from the Florida chapter of the **American Public Works Association** as its 2013 **Project of the Year**.

The **Beachside Village Resort** was recently ranked No. 4 nationally among the top 10 resorts in the U.S. for exceptional service by **TripAdvisor** reviewers. The impressive listing was duly noted in the *Sun-Sentinel's* Business Section.

Fort Lauderdale Magazine did an article about the prevalence of MiMo architecture in LBTS and highlighted specific renovations at the **Tides Inn Hotel** on El Mar Drive. It also published a feature story in May about Broward's threatened coral reefs; the cover was a photo of the beach at **Anglin's Pier**. The article also discussed the Town's Biorock artificial reef habitat project and quoted Town businessmen.

Lighthouse Point Magazine in June published a cover story about the *SS Copenhagen*, a state underwater preserve and shipwreck off the **Sea Watch Restaurant**.

Dive Training Magazine, a national dive publication, ran articles in its June about the Town's upcoming **BugFest-By-The-Sea** event (**July 27-Aug. 2**) for divers.

BugFest helps promote the Town as a fun dive destination

BugFest-By-The-Sea, the Town's annual lobster mini-season dive festival, expects to attract at least 200 divers this summer to **Lauderdale-By-The-Sea**.

Scuba divers can win \$15,000 in cash and dive gear prizes by taking part in the **Great Florida Bug Hunt** contest.



To attract more out-of-town divers to our hotels, BugFest mailed 1,800 postcards to divers on Florida's Gulf Coast who purchased saltwater fishing licenses and lobster stamps.

Seven hotels in Town are offering discounts off their summer rates to divers who stay here.

There are 25 different events during BugFest (**July 27-Aug. 2**), including workshops, seminars, beach

Town grant program helps LBTS neighborhoods

The **Town** wants to help make your neighborhood a nicer place to live.

Under the Town's **Neighborhood Improvement Grant Program**, a neighborhood can receive up to **\$30,000** for entryway signs, street furniture, pillars, public art, lighting, bus stop shade structures, enhanced landscaping, non-secular holiday lighting displays and road surface treatments.

Cameras, gates, guardhouses or other security-related equipment or structures will be considered by the Town on a case-by-case basis.

The application deadline is **Sept. 30, 2014**, and the application form is on the Town's Web site under Documents. The project must have substantial neighborhood support.

How it works

After applications are submitted, staff will verify the budget costs and identify any issues that might complicate the project or increase its cost. Projects will be ranked and submitted to the **Town Commission** for funding consideration. The Town



will fund up to \$30,000 for individual neighborhood projects. Any hard costs the Town incurs (including design and permitting) will be charged against the

\$30,000. Staff time will not be charged. Neighborhoods are responsible for costs over \$30,000.

Phasing of a single project over multiple years to receive multiple grants is not allowed. Smaller stand-alone projects envisioned as part of a larger project may be submitted, but funding for one project does not guarantee funding for the remaining improvements in the future.

Maintenance / Insurance

The neighborhood may be responsible for the maintenance of upgrades the Town does not normally handle, such as any security-related improvements or its association liability insurance. If maintenance or insurance is required, the grant must be submitted by an association or other legal entity, which must also execute an agreement prior to construction.

Project Guidelines

1. Only those goods and services approved by the Town will be paid for with Town funds.
2. Projects must be completed within one year and comply with all Town codes and requirements.
3. For projects greater than \$30,000, prior to the project being designed, the association must have its matching funds on deposit and provide written confirmation those funds will be available.

Eligible Town Neighborhoods

Several Lauderdale-By-The-Sea neighborhoods are eligible for grants under the Town's Neighborhood Improvement Grant Program, including the following:

- Bel-Air.
- Terra Mar Island.
- Lauderdale Surf & Yacht Estates (Codrington Drive, Imperial Lane and Thomas Way).
- North Silver Shores (Commercial Boulevard to Pine Avenue, including North Seagrape Drive).
- North Bougainvillea Drive and North Poinciana Street.
- South Seagrape (South Seagrape Drive, Garden Court, Lake Court, Marine Court, Shore Court).
- South Silver Shores (Tradewinds Drive south of Commercial Boulevard, Miramar Avenue, Capri Avenue).
- South Bougainvillea Drive and South Poinciana Street.
- Tropic Drive, Hibiscus Avenue and Allenwood Drive.

New Town Clerk

Deputy Town Clerk Tedra Smith was promoted to **Town Clerk** in June. She became Deputy Town Clerk in January 2013, shortly after the former Clerk resigned.

Smith began working in the Town's Finance Department in January 2012, but later transferred to the Clerk's Office as a senior office specialist.

Town Manager Connie Hoffman announced Smith's promotion to Town Clerk at the June 12 **Town Commission** meeting. A Fort Lauderdale resident, Smith is studying to earn her Certified Municipal Clerk certification.

The Town Clerk is responsible for maintaining all official Town records, administering Town elections, preparing and posting the agenda packages online, recording votes at Commission meetings and handling public records requests.

incoming vehicle traffic from about **8PM** until the heavy pedestrian traffic subsides, between **10** and **11PM**. Motorists can expect heavy traffic all day long, but especially from **8** to **11PM**. BSO may set-up alternate traffic routes, possibly including directing traffic westbound on Commercial over the Intracoastal Waterway and out of Town.

“If you don’t need to drive, don’t,” Palmer said.

TOWN HISTORY: A LOOK BACK TO 1965


Many people don't like change, but it's safe to say no project brought more change to the **Town of Lauderdale-By-The-Sea** than the **Commercial Boulevard Bridge** over the **Intracoastal Waterway**.

The bridge opened on **Oct. 16, 1965**. Not only did the number of visitors to the Town soon quadruple, but so did the number of headaches experienced by elected officials as they dealt with increased traffic and parking problems.

Mayor Gil Colnot, who had opposed the opening of the bridge, complained that the Town had a population of 3,000 residents "and the traffic problems of a Town of 30,000."

Despite the opposition, the bridge opening was heralded with marching bands, balloons, refreshments and speeches. The Town initially refused to light its half of the bridge and also tried unsuccessfully to limit how often it opened.

To increase revenue to expand traffic enforcement, the Town's Police Department started ticketing speeders for exceeding the 25 mph limit. And in 1969, it nabbed one of the most famous people in the country, *Tonight Show* host **Johnny Carson**. The Town received some national publicity when Carson mentioned the ticket in his nightly monologue.


