Workers making repairs to Anglin's Pier, Town landmark

□ The privately-owned pier is expected to re-open by March.

Anglin's Pier, a Town beachfront landmark known to tourists and visitors around the world, is expected to re-open to residents and tourists by March 1st.

Repairs to the pier started on Dec. 1st, when workers began replacing one of the three-tiered, concrete pilings that support the structure's boardwalk.

The fishing pier was damaged in November 2003, when one of the concrete pilings was struck by debris. **Hurricane Jeanne** in September also damaged the T-section of the pier, knocking off part of the pier's eastern railing.

Phil Bachi, the project manager for the **International Bridge Corp.**, a Fort Lauderdale firm hired to repair the privately-owned pier, said new decking will need to be installed on the east and west ends of the pier.

Sewer installation project will benefit Terra Mar and Bel Air neighborhoods

Starting later this year, the **Town of Lauderdale-By-The-Sea** will build sanitary sewers to service the single-family homeowners in **Terra Mar Island** and **Bel Air**.

The \$5 million project will take an estimated 10 to 12 months to complete for each neighborhood. The first phase of construction will begin in Terra Mar. When finished, 300 homeowners in those northern area neighborhoods will be required to abandon their septic tanks and connect to the new sewer system.

HOMEOWNER COSTS

The cost for Terra Mar and Bel Air property owners to abandon their septic tanks and connect to the new system will vary. **See Page 5.**

The project also includes drainage improvements in Terra Mar. Prior to the Town annexing the North Beach Area in October 2001, **Broward County** repaired and upgraded the drainage system in Bel Air.

"The installation of public sewers will have significant environmental

Stormwater fee will help Town improve drainage

To address drainage problems, the **Town Commission** in December adopted a stormwater utility fee to help fund stormwater drainage improvements.

Several Broward cities have stormwater utility fees, including Fort Lauderdale, Oakland Park, Wilton Manors and Tamarac.

The Commission adopted the fee after reviewing a report from **Hartman & Associates Inc.**, an Orlando firm that studied the issue.

The firm recommended a monthly fee of \$7, but the commission cut the rate to \$3.50, which is expected to generate approximately \$100,000 in annual revenue. Hartman & Associates used Broward Property Appraiser's Office information to determine the amount of impervious surface area on any particular property.

The average single-family home has 4,472 feet of impervious area, which includes roofs and driveways. This area is called an Equivalent Stormwater Unit. Under state and federal law, the Town is required to collect and manage excess rainfall runoff and to also remove any pollutants. □

A group of Town residents from San Isidro, Peru, served as hosts for a Peruvian Dinner Party for the **Lauderdale-By-The-Sea Sister Cities Association** on **Nov. 5th**.

About 30 members and friends enjoyed a great meal and excellent company. This was good preparation for our November visit to San Isidro (*see story at right*).

One consequence of the trip is that we have identified San Isidro's urgent need for medical equipment for needy people with disabilities.

At our Dec. 1st board meeting, we decided to undertake this humanitarian project and will hold a fund-raiser this spring to purchase new wheelchairs from the **Wheelchair Foundation**.

If this is not convenient, Sister Cities will arrange to pick up the donated items.

Retired medical and nursing professionals are also invited to help inspect the donated items for suitability before they are shipped to Peru.

benefits," said **Kevin Hart**, the Town's engineer and the director of engineering with **Craven Thompson & Associates**, a Fort Lauderdale engineering firm hired to plan and oversee the Town's capital improvement project.

"The primary benefit is the elimination of the existing, individual on-site disposal systems and abandonment of the septic tanks," Hart added. "By removing septic tanks, we eliminate the discharge of effluent from the disposal systems, which will reduce and remove contaminants in both the groundwater and the environmentally-sensitive Biscayne Aquifer."

An added benefit for homeowners will be increased property values. The proposed drainage improvements in the Terra Mar Island neighborhood will help protect the environment in the followings three ways:

- Provide an effective drainage system designed to collect and pretreat stormwater runoff prior to discharge.
- Reduce flooding and standing water throughout the study area.
- Provide a primary drainage outfall which will increase flood protection and the ability to "bleed down" the secondary drainage systems within the project area. The collective result will be a major benefit to the environment.


The construction project, one of the largest in recent Town history, was considered during Lauderdale-By-The-Sea's annexation of the North Beach Area in October 2001.

At the time, Town officials indicated an intent to install sanitary sewers in Bel Air and Terra Mar sometime after those neighborhoods were annexed into Lauderdale-By-The-Sea.

A Town flier was mailed out to residents in Terra Mar and Bel Air in December explaining the overall project. □

Homeowners must abandon their septic tanks, but costs could vary

Residential homeowners in **Terra Mar** and **Bel Air** will be required to abandon their septic tanks and hook up to the new sewer system within six months after the system becomes available.



Residents will be required to negotiate with a private plumbing contractor to install a lateral connection to the Town's sanitary

sewer system. Property owners can choose to either have their septic tank pumped out and removed — or pumped out, bottom-crushed and filled with clean sand, according to **Kevin Hart**, the Town's engineer.

Homeowner costs will vary, but residents can expect to pay between \$1,800 and \$5,000. A number of factors will affect your individual

costs, such as:

- The size and location of your septic tank.
- Any costs associated with restoring the property, including the repair or replacement of sod, irrigation, trees, shrubs, planters, fencing, pavers, concrete, landscape features, driveways and/or mailboxes.

Residents also will be required to pay monthly sewer charges.

Once the Terra Mar and Bel Air neighborhoods are connected to the new sewer system, homeowners will begin to pay monthly sewer charges to the **City of Pompano Beach**, which provides sewer service to the Town.

The City of Pompano Beach also has a one-time sewer connection charge of \$100 per dwelling unit. Per Ordinance 51.11(b), the City of Pompano Beach can also charge homeowners a base capital recovery fee charge of \$720 for each sewer tap.

The **Town of Lauderdale-By-The-Sea** is attempting to negotiate a reduction of these Pompano Beach charges. □

Even though the pier was initially damaged more than a year ago, permits from the **Florida Department of Environmental Protection** — which were needed before repairs on the pier could begin — were not issued until November 2004, after the end of the sea turtle nesting season, which starts in April and ends in October.

John Schlegel, the Town's Zoning Code Administrator, said he has received calls from people in Europe who won't schedule their vacations in Town until they know the pier will be open.

The Town's original pier was built in 1941 by **Melvin I. Anglin**, an Indiana real estate investor and building contractor who was instrumental in founding Lauderdale-By-The-Sea. Anglin and his family were the Town's first residents. Anglin later became Lauderdale-By-The-Sea's first mayor.

Nov. 22, 1963, the day **President John F. Kennedy** was assassinated. □


Thank you for making my Christmas special this year
