COMMISSION WORKSHOPS

The Town Commission will hold a workshop meeting on June 6th at 6 PM in Jarvis Hall to discuss establishing an area on the beach where pet owners can take their dogs. At about 7 PM, it will then discuss unifying the Town's north and south zoning codes into the Unified Land Development Regulations.



The Commission will not take any action at the workshop, but the public is invited to express their views on these issues.

THREE PORTALS DEDICATED

The Town recently named three of its new beach portals after longtime Lauderdale-By-The-Sea residents and public officials.

The Pine Avenue portal was dedicated to John and Shirley Forrest. "Jack" Forrest was a former Mayor and Town Manager.

The Datura portal was named after William and Eva Karley. Mr. Karley was a Town Commissioner for 20 years and founding member of the Volunteer Fire Department.

The Hibiscus portal was named after Joseph and Betty Barbara. Mr. Barbara served on the Commission for nine years and was also a VFD founding member.

All Town residents must evacuate if a Hurricane Warning is issued

The warning from **Broward Sheriff's Office Chief Scott Gooding** and **BSO Fire Rescue Battalion Chief John Frailey** is clear: If a **Hurricane Warning** is issued for **Broward County**, **ALL Lauderdale-By-The-Sea** residents **MUST LEAVE TOWN!**

"Go stay with your friends or relatives," Gooding advised.

Because the entire Town is situated on a barrier island, **ALL** residents will be ordered to evacuate east of **U.S. 1** once a warning is posted for our area.

If residents ignore the evacuation order, they do so at their own peril, Frailey said, because there will be no police, paramedics or firefighters in Town to respond to an emergency. All police cars, fire trucks and rescue vehicles are moved to Fort Lauderdale before a hurricane strikes.

"It's going to be unsafe to be in Town," Frailey said.

All police, paramedics and firefighters leave Town once sustained winds reach 40 mph. After that, there's a danger high winds will push over large



BSO offering free smoke alarms to single-family homes on June 24th

The Broward Sheriff's Office Department of Fire Rescue and Emergency Services is sponsoring a "Smoke Alarm Event" in the Town of Lauderdale-By-The-Sea on Saturday, June 24th.

Members of Fire Rescue, the Fire Marshal's Office and Fire Rescue Explorers



will install free battery-operated smoke alarms in

single-family homes. Owners must request them ahead of time.

The alarms are not available to commercial business or condominium owners because of different Fire Code restrictions.

At least one smoke alarm should be placed on every level of your home. The most important location is near bedrooms in order to provide an early warning to all sleeping occupants.

A smoke alarm should also be placed inside every bedroom. If you purchase a smoke alarm, follow the manufacturer's instructions on how to properly install them.

In a fire, a working smoke alarm can save your life and the lives of your loved ones. A working smoke alarm is the single most important means of preventing fire fatalities by providing an early warning.

"Smoke, fire's early warning signal, makes no sound," said **BSO Fire Marshal Charles Raiken**. "By the time you hear any sounds of fire, it may be too late to escape. That is why it is so important to have a working smoke alarm installed in your home."

There are more than 209 fires in

Florida homes every day, according to the **Florida State Fire Marshal**.

Forty percent of those fires start in the kitchen. More than 22 percent are caused by faulty wiring, followed by careless smoking, children playing with matches or lighters, and unattended heating devices. One of the most shocking statistics is that smoke detectors are not present or are inoperative in more than 52 percent of these homes

vehicles, especially crossing the **Commercial Boulevard Bridge**.

"We will not respond during a hurricane," Gooding added. "You're on your own."

The entire Town is built on a barrier island, Florida's first line of defense against hurricanes. Barrier islands protect the coast by breaking down powerful waves and storm surges before they can move inland. Know this: A barrier island that experiences a direct hit from a hurricane will sustain tremendous damage.

"If you stay behind, use a waterproof marker to write your name and date of birth on your arm," Gooding remarked. "That way we can properly identify your body."

Because Hurricane Wilma approached from the west side of Florida — where there was a much lower chance of storm surge — Broward County did not issue a mandatory evacuation order. That decision is now being viewed as a big mistake.

"If we get a warning, we're going to be evacuated," Frailey said.

During a hurricane preparedness workshop meeting, Town commissioners urged **ALL** residents to evacuate and said it would not be acceptable for them to remain in Town.

Some residents feel safe if their condominium is equipped with storm shutters and a generator. What people don't understand, Gooding said, is that while hurricane winds may be 130 mph on the ground, 15 or 20 stories above the street the storm winds can sometimes reach speeds as high as 200 mph.

Residents with boats needing the bridge to be raised will have a short, 3-hour window to move their vessels. The bridge will open to vessels during that period on an "as-needed basis." After that, the bridge will be locked in the down position, allowing cars and other traffic to move back and forth.

"The bridge will not be closed to cars," Gooding said. "It's not the boat parade."

Town residents should watch **Government Access Channel 78** for the latest from BSO about an

approaching hurricane and what steps to take.

Before the storm even hits, he said, all residents should have firm plans about what to do with their pets and where they are going to stay during a hurricane. All Town residents should evacuate to areas west of Federal Highway.

Frailey said residents should make plans now to stay with family or friends. If that's not possible, only then should they make plans to stay in a hurricane shelter.

All residents must evacuate Town when a Hurricane Warning is issued and be self-sufficient for at least 72 hours after they are allowed to return to their homes.

If the Town sustains major damage, it will be up to 72 hours or longer before residents are allowed to return to their homes. Town residents are expected to be prepared and capable of taking care of their own needs for 72 hours.

Frailey said access to the beach will be not only be closed in Town, but in Fort Lauderdale and Pompano Beach as well.

Residents will not be allowed to re-enter the Town if streets are blocked by downed trees and power lines.

"We don't want people driving the streets if wires and trees are down," Gooding said.

Residents will only be allowed

to return if the Town is safe. They must also be able to show police valid identification proving they either live or work in Town.

"It's a safety issue, not a convenience issue," Gooding said. "At some point we have to be really tough about who we're going to let in."

Town officials said once residents are allowed to return to their homes, they need to be prepared to be self-sufficient for at least three full days (72 hours), the time it takes to clear most roads and remove downed lines. That's also when most stores are starting to re-open and gas becomes more available.

The Town learned some valuable lessons from **Hurricane Wilma** in 2005. To improve communication, it purchased portable radios and five satellite phones for key personnel. It also bought different cell phones, in case some cell services remain viable. During Hurricane Wilma last year, some cell services did not work.

In a Town Commission workshop meeting to discuss what steps staff has proposed for hurricane preparations, **Town Manager Robert Baldwin** said: "The Town will be as prepared as possible."

The Town purchased a generator for **Jarvis Hall**, which it plans to convert into an **Emergency Operations Center** for police, fire, rescue and key Town personnel before and after the storm. Town Hall's analog phones were also repaired. Town Hall has a generator, which will allow Town employees to do their best to meet residents' emergency needs.

Because the Town has no schools or hospitals, it is not on **Florida Power & Light's** priority list to restore power. Residents should expect to be without power for several days.

Municipal Services Director William Mason said the Town's biggest challenges after a hurricane are clearing roads, power restoration, restoring water service and debris removal. He said the Town plans three hurricane debris pick-ups if a storm hits the Town this year. "People need to put debris curbside as quickly as possible after they return to their homes," Mason said. □

All residents must prepare for hurricanes

Hurricanes are a normal phenomenon in South Florida and throughout the state. Each year, particularly between **June 1st and Nov. 30th**, all residents and visitors need to be prepared for the effects of a hurricane or severe weather.

The information on this page will define typical hurricane terms and explain how to protect yourself, your family and your home. It will also offer suggestions on where to evacuate, since all Town residents **MUST LEAVE** once a **Hurricane Warning** is posted.

Know the Hazards

Wind — A hurricane is a tropical storm with constant winds greater than 74 miles per hour. These winds can extend inland for hundreds of miles. Hurricanes can spawn tornadoes which add to its potential destruction.

Rain — Because of the tropical nature of a hurricane, they contain rain. Sometimes the torrential rain will cause floods and flash flooding.

Storm Surge — This is the most dangerous element of a hurricane.

Storm surge is a dome of ocean water that can be 20 feet high at its peak and 50 to 100 miles wide. Nine out of 10 hurricane fatalities are attributable to storm surge.

Watches and Warnings

Hurricane Watch: The **National Weather Service** issues this advisory when there is a threat of hurricane conditions in 24 to 36 hours.

Hurricane Warning: This advisory is issued when a hurricane is expected in 24 hours or less. □

YOU MUST BE SELF-SUFFICIENT FOR 72 HOURS


Before or at the very start of any hurricane season, all **Lauderdale-By-The-Sea** residents should:

- Develop a family plan (include your pets) for hurricane survival. Because the entire **Town** is on a **BARRIER ISLAND**, all Town residents **MUST EVACUATE** when a hurricane threatens Broward County! Residents also need to be self-sufficient for **72 HOURS** after they are allowed to return to their homes.

- Obtain the necessary materials to protect your windows and doors. Do not forget the garage door.

- Check your roof and the structure of your house. Make all necessary repairs beforehand.

- Trim trees and branches, remove coconuts and other yard debris (watch out for power lines). The Town has an ordinance requiring all residents to remove coconuts from their palm trees! Do not wait for a hurricane warning!



- Check fire extinguishers.
- Identify a friend or family member (outside the area) to keep track on how you are doing. Instruct other people in your family to get information on how you are doing from them.

Decide Now Where You And Your Family Will Go When The Next Hurricane Threatens

— Decide on a specific place, such as the protected house of a friend outside the evacuation zone, a secure motel or hotel or — as a last resort — a public shelter.

— Do not stay in any structure without good shutters or properly-designed and installed hurricane protection.

— Do not plan on evacuating by driving **Florida's Turnpike** or **I-95**. Those highways will be jammed.

— Do not count on going to the airport and flying out.

— Plan to stay in South Florida. □






