Voters elect Mayor, two Commissioners

Lauderdale-By-The-Sea Mayor Scot Sasser was re-elected to his second mayoral term while former **Planning & Zoning Board Chairman Buz Oldaker** won an open seat on the **Town Commission**.



Oldaker beat former P&Z board member **Yann Brandt** for the District 2 Commission seat held by **Commissioner Stuart Dodd**, who was term-limited after serving two consecutive terms.

Sasser defeated Town resident **James A. Pady**.

District 1 **Commissioner Mark Brown** was re-elected to a second four-year term without opposition.

All three elected officials were sworn into office on March 29.

Thirty-nine percent of the Town's **5,232 registered voters** cast ballots in the March 15th election, which was also a Presidential primary. The voter turnout county-wide was 36 percent. Certified election results are available on the **Broward Supervisor of Elections** Web site at www.browardsoe.org.

Commissioner Dodd steps down after 8 years

Commissioner Stuart Dodd left office on March 29th after serving eight years on the **Town Commission**, including two years as **Vice Mayor**.

Dodd served two consecutive 4-year terms and was term-limited, although Town elected officials are allowed to run again after taking a two-year break.

The Commission honored Dodd with a **Proclamation** at its March 29 meeting thanking him for his service and leadership on many of the positive changes that were made throughout the Town during his tenure.

Among the many issues and projects Dodd championed while in office were the license plate reader cameras to deter crime, the restaurant parking exemption program to encourage economic development, the award-winning **Commercial Boulevard Streetscape** projects, and replacing **BSO Fire Rescue** with the **Volunteer Fire Department**.



CRIME TIPS

The **Broward Sheriff's Office** wants residents to be proactive when it comes to deterring crime. **Sgt. Pete Lagana** said there are many things residents can do to keep from becoming victims, including the following:

- Keep a front door light on at night.
- Use motion lights.
- Make sure the bushes and trees on your property don't provide cover for criminals to hide while breaking into your house.
- Never leave your car unlocked or valuable items in plain view. "Most criminals are pretty lazy," Lagana said, saying there's no need for criminals to break into a vehicle if they know they can find one unlocked.
- Call the police if you see or hear something suspicious. "See something, say something," Lagana said. "Pick up the phone and call."
- Be wary of scams. He said the IRS, banks and credit card firms will never call to confirm your Social Security number or other personal info.

SELF-DEFENSE

Martial arts grandmaster **Vincent Marchetti**, a 10th degree black belt and **U.S. Army** veteran who has trained Navy Seals, Green Berets and White House security officers, will teach a special self-defense class for senior and adults in **Jarvis Hall** from **11AM to 1PM**



on **Saturday, April 16th. The class is free.**

Marchetti (see photo), a Town resident, offered to teach the 2-hour class after speaking

with **Mayor Scot Sasser**.

He will teach basic self-defense concepts, including how to stay alert to your surroundings, how to escape your attacker, hurting your assailant and legal items you can carry to protect yourself.

A former Army drill instructor, Marchetti has taught self-defense to local, state and federal law enforcement, including the U.S. Capitol police, U.S. Air Marshals and the Department of Defense.

YELLOW DOT

The **Volunteer Fire Department** is participating in Broward County's **Yellow Dot** program, which alerts paramedics to your special medical needs if you are involved in an automobile accident and unable to speak.

A Yellow Dot decal — displayed on a car's rear windshield or in a clearly visible location on a motorcycle or truck — alerts paramedics and other emergency responders to look for the Yellow Dot



pamphlet in your vehicle's glove compartment.

The medical info you provide helps emergency responders decide how to best treat you if you cannot communicate.

Enrollment in the program is simple. Yellow Dot decals and pamphlets are available at the fire station, **Town Hall**, Jarvis Hall, BSO and all Broward County Regional Libraries. For more information, please visit **www.Broward.org/YellowDot**.

He also was a fervent advocate for a ban on the sale of puppy mill dogs in Town.

Dodd supported keeping Town property taxes low (Lauderdale-By-The-Sea has the **third lowest tax rate** in Broward County), restoring civility and decorum to Commission meetings, purchasing property downtown for public restrooms, repealing overlay districts that allowed for taller buildings, and expanding the hours diners can purchase alcohol in restaurants on Sundays to compete with neighboring cities.

Dodd's experience as an engineer and a round-the-world sailor enabled him to capably represent the Town on the **Hillsboro Inlet District Commission** for eight years, and also on the **Southeast Florida Coastal Ocean Task Force** for the past 18 months.

The Task Force, which was comprised of elected officials from Miami-Dade, Broward, Palm Beach and Martin counties, evaluated regional ocean management issues and proposed solutions, something right up his line as Commissioner Dodd was a strong advocate for protecting and expanding the Town's and Florida's fragile coral reefs.

Stuart and his wife, **Penny**, are looking forward to traveling, taking more summer courses at **Oxford University** in England (something that his busy Commission meeting schedule restricted), and spending more time with their kids and grandchildren.

Orchid Walk project takes root along Commercial

To encourage pedestrian traffic along **Commercial** west of **A1A**, the Town attached 250 orchids to the trees along the roadway between A1A and the bridge.

The 'Orchid Walk' idea was suggested by the **Lauderdale-By-The-Sea Garden Club**, which worked on the project with Town staff, the Chamber of Commerce and local businesses.

Project supporters included the Property Owners' Association, the Lauderdale-By-The-Sea Women's Club, Flynn Engineering, Minto, Christopher's Garden of Love and Welcome-by-the-Sea. The Town donated \$2,000 and the Municipal Service employees needed to hang the orchids.

Eight varieties of orchids were used: *Dendrobium*, *Brassavolas nodosa*, *Shomburgkia*, *Phaelenopsis*, *Oncidium*, *Enciclia*, *Epidendrum* and *Cattleya*.

The Garden Club thanked the Fort Lauderdale Orchid Society and Tony Millet for their invaluable support.

An Orchid Walk Celebration is set for **Thursday, April 7** from **5:30 to 7:30PM** in all four business plazas west of Sea Grape Drive. A formal ceremony with remarks from officials starts at **6PM** in the **Parrotfish Plaza**, where Minto will provide refreshments. There will be music in all four plazas, provided by the Town. Attendees are invited to visit all of the plazas.

AREA OF FOCUS

SUSTAINABILITY/ENVIRONMENT

The **Town** is developing a **Strategic Plan** to identify its key goals and important projects for the next five years. The process began when a large group of residents attended a community meeting in **Jarvis Hall** on Jan. 19th and brainstormed suggestions on what the Town needs to accomplish by **2021**. There was an amazing amount of agreement on what needs to be done.

For those who could not attend that community workshop, a survey on the topic was placed online for two months and 63 people responded to it. And, finally, the **Town Commission** met early one morning with the business community in February to gather its input.

Town staff then took all of the ideas on which there was consensus and categorized them under five **Areas of Focus**, laying out specific action steps and a timeline to complete them.

The ideas proposed under the first two focus areas — “Sustainability/Environment” and “Preserving the Town’s Way of Life”— are presented in this issue. The other three focus areas will be published in the next edition of **Town Topics**.

The Commission will consider whether to adopt this plan at an upcoming workshop meeting in April. Please watch our Web site (lbts-fl.gov) for the date if you wish to attend and participate, or call or e-mail members of the Commission with your thoughts.

Goal No. 1**Protect the beach**

A. Continue sea oat planting projects wherever feasible and where the adjacent property owner(s) agrees to the project. Ongoing

B. Create a beach management plan, including a budget and timeline. FY17

C. Implement the beach management plan. FY18-FY21

Goal No. 2**Protect existing coral reefs & develop new ones**

A. Acquire and review reef monitoring reports from the Segment II beach nourishment project and any other legitimate sources. FY16 & FY17

B. Fund Phase II plantings of the Nova Southeastern University staghorn coral project in Lauderdale-By-The-Sea per our contract. FY17

C. Get annual reports from Nova on survival and growth of the transplanted corals. FY16, FY17 & FY18

D. Create an artificial reef with limestone boulders to create a fish and coral habitat within snorkeling distance from the beach.

Apply to the Florida DEP for a permit for the project. FY16

Upon receipt of the permit, apply for a grant to assist in the cost of installing the limestone boulders. FY17

Budget the required match for the grant. FY18

E. Educate the public about the critical importance of the reefs, their fragility, and threats. FY17

**Goal No. 3****Develop and implement a Sustainability Plan**

A. Establish a Sustainability Committee to develop a sustainability plan

Define the purpose of the Sustainability Committee. FY16

Appoint a Committee and assign a staff liaison FY17

Sustainability Committee meets, researches and recommends a Sustainability Plan for the Town. FY17

Staff develops cost estimates of top ten priorities in the Committee’s recommended plan. FY18

B. Town Commission reviews the Sustainability Committee’s recommended plan, modify as necessary and adopts the plan. FY18

C. Incorporate the adopted plan into the operating budget and five year CIP. FY18

D. Plan for sea rise impact. FY18-FY21

Goal No. 4**Build public restrooms to serve the downtown and beach visitors**

A. Seek additional bidders and modify the design of the restroom project to reduce construction costs. Spring 2016

B. Explore the costs of prefab bathroom units that are consistent with the design quality we are seeking. Spring 2016

C. Determine a location for additional bathrooms to serve the beach-going public. Spring 2017

D. Budget for the construction of additional bathrooms. 2018 Budget

Hold more special events for residents & visitors

- A. Survey residents and businesses to determine types of events they are seeking. FY17

- C. Implement Commission direction. FY18

Goal No. 2

Preserve/protect height limits & Town scale

- A. Make the compatibility of the scale of a proposed building or project to the adjacent properties and surrounding area a crucial aspect of consideration of any site plan reviews or architectural reviews. Ongoing
- B. Ensure that public building projects are examples of appropriate scale for their surroundings and the Town as a whole. Ongoing

Goal No. 3

Preserve/protect LBTS's identity and culture (small town, beachy)

- A. Working with an architectural consultant with expertise in Mid-Century Modern design, provide suggestions to property owners who are redeveloping properties that were originally built in the MIMO style about restoring or preserving mid-century design features. Ongoing
- B. Protect the LBTS brand and apply it (in terms of colors, style, and scale) to street furniture, banners, public building, parks and plaza designs, advertising and marketing materials. Ongoing
- C. Keep events wholesome and appropriate in scale to our small town environment, as well as consistent with parking and traffic limitations. Ongoing
- D. Maintain the tradition of personal attention to residents and businesses from Town staff. Ongoing

Goal No. 4

Maintain & improve walkability of the Town

- A. Advocate for the design of the El Mar Greenway

project to emphasize pedestrian needs and a safe pedestrian environment.

- Pedestrian-level lighting along the pathway and sidewalks
- Shade trees
- Shaded seating areas
- Adequate number of trash containers & doggie sanitary stations. Fall 2016 and Winter 2017

B. Prioritize aspects of the Greenway design for which MPO/FDOT grant funds are not available and apply the remaining reserve for El Mar pedestrian improvements to fund those priorities as far as possible. Then determine whether remaining priorities will be funded from another source. Spring 2017

C. Expand pedestrian amenities throughout Town.

- Install lighted bollards at all beach portals. FY16 and FY17
- Install & maintain adequate trash containers & doggie sanitary stations to meet needs of the public. Ongoing

Participate in meetings set up by Congressional representatives with the Department of Justice of HUD personnel in an effort to get them to modify their position on the extreme limitation of municipal authority to apply reasonable zoning regulations to medical residential facilities. Spring 2016 and ongoing

B. Town Commissioners to personally contact members of the Broward congressional and Florida Legislature to request their proactive support of legislative changes to provide more municipal authority to regulate both of these uses. Ongoing

C. Town Attorney and Town staff to propose changes to the Town's vacation rental ordinance to regulate this use to the extent allowed by Florida law. Summer 2016

Protect Our Beaches

Loggerhead sea turtles annually nest on the Town's beaches and elsewhere in Florida. The peak sea turtle nesting months for loggerheads are June and July.
