Urban Design speakers address key ideas for the Town's future

Urban Designer **Gianno Feoli** made more than a dozen visits to **Lauderdale-By-The-Sea** before he delivered his fascinating presentation in **Jarvis**

Hall in mid-March on the many examples of **Miami Modern** architecture here in **Lauderdale-By-The-Sea**.

Known as "MiMo", it is a post-**World War II** style of architecture with strong horizontal lines and prominent vertical features that emphasize Florida's tropical environment. He noted that our Town has a lower-scale version of MiMo than found on **Miami Beach**.

Referring to the **Master Plan** update process now underway in the community, which will address building design issues, Feoli told the audience: "You have the opportunity to build upon something that's already unique. You don't have to fabricate an image. You've already got authenticity ... just build on it."

Town will implement CodeRED emergency alert system in April

■ Residents and business owners will be called on April 13th as the Town implements its new program

All **Town of Lauderdale-By-The-Sea** residents will receive an automated telephone call between **10AM and 4 PM** on **Wednesday, April 13th** as the Town tests **CodeRED** — its new emergency notification program — in advance of the upcoming **2011 Hurricane Season**.

Using CodeRED, every resident in Town can be notified within a matter of minutes about any possible number of natural or other local emergencies, such as a hurricane, natural gas leak, chemical spill, boil water advisory, bomb threat or a missing child or elderly person.

The initial Town-wide call is being made on **April 13th** to test the system and direct residents to the Town's Web site, where they can click a CodeRED link that directs them to **Lauderdale-By-The-Sea's Community Notification Enrollment** page.

IMPROVING ECONOMIC VITALITY

The **Town Commission** is taking positive steps to help improve the Town's economic vitality. It recently expanded the number of allowed business uses in Town and tentatively adopted a less restrictive ordinance in March on restaurant

alcohol sales (to allow our restaurants to compete with Fort Lauderdale and other cities with similar early morning sales laws). The ordinance is expected to receive final approval on April 27th



Here are three aspects of the economic vitality effort in

Town that are now underway:

Parking Exemptions

The Commission in March amended the Town's parking ordinance to exempt required parking spaces for any new restaurant that wants to open — or for any existing restaurant here that wants to expand its business.

A parking utilization study completed by the Town showed there were 120 parking spaces available east of Ocean Drive and 105 spaces available west of Ocean Drive.

Under the amended ordinance, the Town is allowed to waive up to 30 parking spaces for a restaurant east of Ocean Drive and up to 50 parking spaces west of Ocean Drive. The exemptions weren't the same in order to encourage larger businesses west of Ocean Drive.

The ordinance will be in effect for four years or until the number of

total parking spaces dedicated to this program are allocated.

The new ordinance does not apply to retail business because all the existing buildings in the downtown area meet the Town's parking



BurgerFi opened in January and has been packed with locals and tourists.

requirements.

New Parking Meters

Tired of searching for quarters? Lots of visitors to Lauderdale-By-The-Sea were, so the Town installed five new parking pay stations (see *photo at upper left*) in the downtown area on **March 25th**.

Motorists can now pay for parking using a credit card. In mid-April, motorists will even be able to pay for parking using their cell phone.

This new convenience is expected to increase parking revenue and reduce the number of parking tickets motorists receive, which adversely affects our image as a friendly place to visit.

Town residents, of course, can purchase an annual Town parking permit for \$53. If you are 65 or older, the permit costs just \$42.40. Permit holders can park in any metered parking spot for up to three hours or in any spot marked

Resident Parking Permit. The permits are good from **Oct. 1 to Sept. 30.**

After **July 1**, the cost of the permit is reduced by 40 percent.

Economic Report

An economic study by **Redevelopment Management Associates**, the Town's economic advisor, will be presented to the Commission at a workshop on **April 5 at 7PM in Jarvis Hall.**

RMA reviewed the Town's revised Master Plan from an economic development standpoint. It will include recommendations on what the Town overlooked and what is important economically for the projects outlined in the plan to succeed.

RMA, which played a key role in helping the cities of **Delray Beach, Fort Lauderdale and Hollywood** with their successful economic redevelopment efforts, held a lively discussion with Lauderdale-By-The-Sea hoteliers in Town on Feb. 21.

New Businesses

Three new businesses recently opened in Town, and another one underwent a substantial renovation.

BurgerFi, 4343 N. Ocean Drive, opened in January and has been jam packed with Spring Breakers, tourists and residents. .

Alley Oop, 220 E. Commercial Blvd., opened in December. Alley Oop sells skimboards, related sport gear and clothing.

CoCo Yogurt, 107 E. Commercial Blvd., opened in late October and offers a variety of tasty treats.

Lenore Nolan-Ryan's Cooking School and Catering, 228 E. Commercial Blvd., recently underwent a renovation that included new counters, paint and other upgrades that gave the interior an urban and sleek design. Her cooking school and catering firm opened in Town in 2004. □

Commission wants entryway beautification signs throughout the entire community

The **Town Commission** has approved the concept of allocating funds in upcoming budget years to install entryway features at neighborhoods throughout the community.

The **Bel Air Civic Association** installed an entryway sign in its neighborhood in 2010. The **Terra Mar Island Association** also recently received approval from the Town to proceed with plans to upgrade the entryway to its neighborhood.

Bel Air and Terra Mar both have neighborhood associations, but the Commission said residents do not need to form an association to ask for an

improved entryway.

And even if an area doesn't ask for a sign, the Town may decide to offer to build one anyway. The residents in that area would of course be asked to provide input on the design.

Commissioners said they would like to see \$40,000 allocated in upcoming budget years to design and install entryway beautification signs throughout Lauderdale-By-The-Sea.

Congressman West asks U.S. Postmaster to address Town ZIP Code problem

Congressman Allen B. West has asked the **U.S. Postmaster General** to resolve the **Town's ZIP Code** problem. The Town is covered by two Zip Codes: **33308** (which serves the original Town) and **33062**, which serves the north part of Town, which didn't join Lauderdale-By-The-Sea until it was annexed in 2001.

Despite repeated requests to unite the Town under the 33308 ZIP Code — or to create a new ZIP Code for us — the **Postal Service** has declined to grant our request.

West sent a letter to **U.S. Postmaster General Patrick Donahoe** asking him to reconsider the issue in our favor. Residents who live in the north part of Town have ongoing issues with mail delivery and a host of other problems when using the 33062 ZIP Code, which is recognized as being in the **City of Pompano Beach**.

"The Town ... deserves either its own new ZIP Code or for the entire Town to be placed under the 33308 ZIP Code," West stated in his March 15 letter to Donahoe. □

Beachfront lighting tips during turtle season

Sea turtles date back to the **Age of Dinosaurs**. Of the seven species of sea turtles worldwide, three of these — loggerhead, green and leatherback — nest annually on Florida beaches from March through September. The loggerhead is by far the most common sea turtle.

Since tiny sea turtle hatchlings are often drawn in the wrong direction by bright artificial lights along the beach, here are some lighting suggestions that will help you help sea turtles survive.

TIPS

- Keep lights in your condo from shining onto the beach by closing your drapes or blinds.
- Other beachfront lights in parking lots or on buildings must be shielded or turned off at night from sunset to sunrise (from March 1 to Oct. 31).
- As much as possible, refrain

from walking on the beach at night from April through August. No matter how quiet, humans will often, and unknowingly, frighten nesting sea turtles back into the sea.

— If you happen to come across a **sea turtle hatchling** crawling towards the road or a parking lot, you can take the following steps:

— Call the **Broward Sea Turtle Hotline** at **954-328-0580**.

— If you do not remember the hotline number, pick up the hatchling and take it to the water's edge. Make sure the beach is dark. Let the turtle crawl from the beach to the ocean.

— If there are numerous hatchlings, put them in a dry bucket before taking them to the water's edge on a darkened area of the beach. It is important to let them crawl along the sand before they reach the water.

Feoli's presentation included dozens of photos of motels and hotels in Town built in the 1950s and 1960s in the Miami Modern style. The "MiMo" style was not only evident in many buildings in Town, but also in many signs.

Some of MiMo's features include angled horizontal lines with strong vertical elements or anchors, transparent building facades that let in more light and air, flat roofs with angles, and winding catwalks; all blend together to emphasize the tropical outdoors.




One of the examples he used was the **Driftwood Beach Club** on El Mar Drive, a U-shaped building that wraps around an "easily approachable" space — its landscaped pool.

"MiMo here really exhibits a domesticated

form," Feoli said. "It's taken from the large scale resort condition out of reach and brought down to the 'everybody' level."

He said people want to visit and live in a place where they can be outside and enjoy the ocean. People want to park their cars, walk to the beach, eat breakfast and exercise.

"I was flabbergasted by the sheer amount of people that were walking up El Mar Drive in the morning," said Feoli, a senior landscape designer and project manager with **Calvin, Giordano & Associates**, a Fort Lauderdale engineering and land planning firm. "It was really astonishing."



Captains Quarters Resort on El Mar was included in Gianni Feoli's presentation as an example of Miami Modern architecture where a prominent vertical feature "anchors" the building. The Seahorse Apartments and Bermuda Isles signs are other examples. The angled sign shapes exhibit a playful and futuristic feeling.

Town Manager Connie Hoffmann thanked former **Master Plan Steering Committee member Helene Wetherington**, who works with Feoli, for suggesting we tap his expertise on architecture.

Wetherington said Feoli's seminar was a great educational opportunity. She said it was hard for her to understand the Town's unique architectural features before Feoli's crash course on MiMo.

"Change is going to happen," Wetherington said. "Do we want to guide the change, or just watch it as it develops for better or worse?"

Feoli urged the Town to survey its architecturally-significant buildings and to draft policies that will help preserve their uniqueness while also encouraging projects that emphasize "harmonious public spaces."

He said people want to come to a location and environment, "not just a hotel."

Feoli said the Town has an opportunity to establish a zoning policy and design guidelines that will help enhance the Town's unique position as a community that has maintained its own sense of place while other cities around it changed.

Feoli cautioned the Town not to create "fake MiMo," but to develop



its own unique image and identity and to later brand it and market it.

"This is about you and want you want," he emphasized.

Feoli was the third expert speaker to address residents in the Town's Urban Design Series.

The Town also held three **Master Plan Input Sessions** in March where residents suggested new ideas and provided lots of feedback on the Master Plan revisions. The community sessions were held in Jarvis Hall on **March 12, 24 and 26**.

At the **March 22nd** Commission meeting, resident **Ken Kugler** told Commissioners he was thankful for the "wonderful" opportunity to attend the March 12th input session, where he was able to express his opinions.

"That's a tangible step in the right direction towards accomplishing something in this Town," he said. □

Sucher, Plater-Zyberk jump start Urban Design discussions

Two expert speakers kicked off the Town's **Urban Design Series** in January and March as the Town began revising its **Master Plan** to help guide our future development.

Famed city planner **Elizabeth Plater-Zyberk**, dean of the **University of Miami's School of Architecture**, addressed how we can preserve our unique "sense of place" as our local economy changes.

When asked how the Town could distinguish itself from **Fort Lauderdale**, she said she a Town entryway sign wasn't as important as the quality of the Town's public spaces.

"It's really about how you treat the whole community so that it (reflects) the character of the Town," she said.

Plater-Zyberk said we are in a good position because growth isn't critical to our economic sustainability.

She said the Town's assets include a street grid that promotes walkability, a stable tax base, and

height limits.

Plater-Zyberk urged residents to focus on goals we want to achieve rather than "what we don't want."

Touching on an issue **Urban Designer Gianni Feoli** would later address in his seminar (*see the story on Page 1 and 6*), she urged the Town to use our zoning code to determine what architectural features we want to preserve.

Acknowledging the economic difficulties faced in keeping small motels from being bought up and turned into townhomes, which reduces the number of hotel rooms for tourists, Plater-Zyberk said we should consider allowing motel

owners to swap development rights with commercial properties elsewhere in Town.

She also suggested bringing in hotel industry experts to advise us on what can be done to revitalize some of our aging motels and hotels.

Former **Master Plan Steering Committee Co-Chair Sandra Booth**, who recalled when Plater-Zyberk first addressed the commit-

tee four years ago, said her March 1st seminar touched on several key issues the Town is now looking at.

"I thought she had a lot of good ideas for a Town like ours," she said.

Opening Seminar

The first seminar in the Urban Design series was presented on **Jan. 7** by **David Sucher**. A former

Seattle city planner and the author of *City Comforts: How to Build an Urban Village*, Sucher also spent 90 minutes the next day leading about 40 residents on a tour of the downtown district from the beach pavilion west along Commercial Boulevard.

“The walk around I thought was very good and informative,” said resident **Ron Piersante**. “I thought he had some excellent ideas.”

Sucher told residents on the tour that the Town parking lots on Commercial west of State Road A1A are not inviting for pedestrians, which he mentioned the night before when he started his presentation.

One of his seminar topics was titled “Bumping Into People,” which was about communities creating urban environments where residents and tourists feel comfortable meeting.

Sucher also talked about the three basic rules of good urban design:

— Build to the sidewalks so that people can easily walk into a store.

— Make building facades more open and inviting by adding doors and windows you can see through. On his tour, he pointed out instances where stores didn’t do this.

— Prohibit parking lots in front of buildings, which create strip malls (where people don’t like to walk).

“It doesn’t create a walkable main street,” Sucher said. □

Once there (see the Web page graphic on Page 9), residents can enter their address and contact information.

If residents also want to receive e-mails from the Town about important Town meetings, programs and events, be sure to check the **General Notification Box**. If you also fill out the **Account Creation Box**, you can later opt out of receiving any Town e-mails.

The enrollment page is where you can submit additional calling data, text and e-mail addresses, as well as TDD/TTY requirements for the hearing-impaired.

Municipal Services Director Don Prince, who researched the system and brought it to the Commission’s attention, urges all residents and business owners to visit our Web site — **www.lbts-fl.gov** — to add their personal or business contact information.

“If your information is not in the database, you will not be notified in an emergency,” Prince said. “Businesses should register, as well as individuals with unlisted phone numbers, people who have changed their

phone number recently, and those who only use a cell phone or have VoIP phones (such as Vonage) as their primary numbers.” □

If you know someone in Lauderdale-By-The-Sea who did not receive this call, please encourage them to visit the Town’s Web site and enter their information.

“If you do not have Internet access, please ask a friend or family member to help add your contact information to our emergency database. You can also call Town Hall for assistance at 954-275-2801. That is 954-275-2801. Thank you.”

Artificial reef project to be deployed soon south of Anglin's Pier

The Town's artificial reef project will soon hit the water.

The new reef, which will be located south of **Anglin's Pier** near the Town's **Snorkel Trail**, is expected to be deployed before **June 1st**.

The reef structure and solar-powered buoy will be deployed by scuba divers from **Cry of the Water**, a local marine environmental group. Artificial reefs, which provide additional underwater



habitat for endangered corals, sponges and colorful tropical fish, are very common off **Broward County's** shores.

The Town's reef project, however, will be the first in the U.S. to use a low-voltage electric current — powered by solar-powered batteries in a buoy — to help stimulate coral growth.

The electric current will travel from the surface buoy to the frame of the reef 15 feet below.

The long-awaited reef project, which required permits from **Broward County**, the **State of Florida** and the federal government, was first proposed in July 2005 by **Thomas Goreau**, president of **Global Coral Reef Alliance**, a non-profit organization based in Cambridge, Mass.

Under the Town's contract with the organization, which was renegotiated this year to better protect the Town's legal interests, corals will later be transplanted to the reef structure. The contract also calls for the reef to be monitored and reports prepared on the coral growth for two years. □
