## University of Miami team impresses Town residents

Since opening in 1965, **Jarvis Hall** has been used for **Town Hall** meetings, beauty pageants, plays, flower shows and rummage sales. A new use can now be added: college campus.

For six days in May, Jarvis Hall was transformed into the **University of Miami School of Architecture's** north quad as 40 graduate student architects, undergrads and faculty members arrived for an

intensive workshop to re-design key Town areas.

With parts of the community showing definite signs

of aging and disrepair, and a desire to improve the retail mix along **Commercial Boulevard**, the **Town Commission** enthusiastically accepted UM's offer to be the focus for the architecture school's annual **Capstone Workshop**, where students get valuable, real-world experience outside the classroom.

## Commercial Boulevard bridge to be repainted; temporary closure likely

Starting sometime in July and lasting through October, the **Commercial Boulevard Bridge** spanning the **Intracoastal Waterway** will be repainted by the **Florida Department of Transportation**.

The project will require single-lane traffic closures over the bridge while the work is underway and a complete closure for a short period of time.

## Program offers Town residents prescription discounts


Starting on **Monday, July 11th**, **Lauderdale-By-The Sea** residents can save an average of 20 percent at local pharmacies on prescriptions not covered by their insurance.

The prescription discount card is being made available to residents after the **Town Commission** agreed to participate in the **National League of Cities** health program.

Here are the card's benefits:

- It's free and you can use it for any member of your family.
- Use it as often as you want.
- Most pharmacies accept it.
- The card can even be used to purchase drugs that are also sometimes prescribed for pets.

You can use the card anywhere, not just in Lauderdale-By-The-Sea.

**Mayor Roseann Minnet** will kick off the new program by talking with seniors on **July 11** at **1 PM** in Jarvis Hall. The prescription cards will also be available at that meeting.

The card is **not** insurance. By using it, you agree to pay the entire prescription cost minus the discount. Savings may vary by drug and by pharmacy location. Savings are based on 2009 drug purchases for all drug discount card programs run by CVS Caremark. Claims are not eligible for reimbursement through **Medicaid**, **Medicare** or other government program. ■

## Help keep children and pedestrians safe at intersections

To increase public safety for children on bicycles, pedestrians and motorists, the **Town** started asking homeowners in June to voluntarily cut back their hedges and other vegetation if it obstructs the view of drivers or pedestrians approaching an intersection or driveway.

**Town Code Compliance Officer Kim Williams** said the safety problem is town-wide. "It's not just one neighborhood," she pointed out.

On corner lots at the intersection of two streets and on all lots with driveways, there is an area of private property called the 'clear sight triangle' (see diagram at right).

Here is how the **Town Code** regulates and defines clear sight triangles, which must be maintained on corner lots and driveways:


### Section 30-313.4(h) visibility limitations:

**(h)** ... No walls, fences, hedges or plantings shall be planted or maintained to a height exceeding 30 inches above the crown of the roadway within sight visibility triangles: within 25 feet of the intersection of the front and side property lines, within 10 feet of any driveway, within 10 feet from the intersection point of the edge of a driveway and alley or street, and within 15 feet from the intersection point of the extended property lines at an alley and a street.

Trees that extend over sidewalks or roadways are to be maintained per Section 30-313 23.5(d) trees:

**(d)** ... Tree limbs shall be maintained at least eight feet above the sidewalk and ten feet above the roadway. Trees shall not be planted closer than 20 feet from a street light pole, utility pole, fire hydrant, traffic sign, traffic signal pole or street name sign.

Williams said the Town began issuing letters to homeowners in



June. The letter asks residents to trim any plantings located within the clear sight triangle exceeding 30 inches.

The Town plans to re-visit neighborhoods after the bulk trash pickup in August, which the Town believes should give homeowners enough time to voluntarily comply.

Bulk trash pick-up dates are **July 1** and **Aug. 5** If you live **north of Commercial Boulevard; south of Commercial** the bulk pick-up dates

are **July 7** and **Aug. 4**.

The offer was made by **Elizabeth Plater-Zyberk**, the well-known dean of UM's School of Architecture; she was one of three speakers who delivered seminars in Town on urban design earlier this year.

The cost to the Town to bring UM here was \$16,500 (plus fabulous lunches from our local restaurants).

"It was an opportunity to get high quality design work at a fraction of the normal cost," **Town Manager Connie Hoffman** said. "We originally estimated it would have cost the Town in excess of \$100,000 if we had to pay for the design work the university would do."

The UM team said it put 2,000 work hours into the project, which places the value of their efforts even higher than estimated.

"I think we were very fortunate to have these students," said **Sandra Booth**, one of dozens of residents who attended the half-day **Design Charrette on Saturday, May 21**. "What we got from these students we couldn't possibly buy."

Within the confines of the Town's **Master Plan**, UM was asked to develop designs that provided solutions to problematic areas in the community while preserving our small, seaside village character.

"We heard loud and clear how much you love the community and want to protect it," said **Charles Bohl**, an associate professor at UM who oversaw the capstone project.

The process began with the Design Charrette, where residents first got the chance to express their views to the students. It ended on **Thursday, May 26**, when UM presented its designs during a two-hour public meeting.

"I thought they did a great job," said resident **David Nixon**, who dropped by Jarvis Hall several times to speak with the students. "I thought they were fabulous."

The students met with many Town residents (as well as **Town Commissioners**), went on a tour

with **Mayor Roseann Minnet** as their guide and interviewed numerous business owners and hoteliers about the problems they face.

Many students and faculty also stayed overnight in Town thanks to the generosity of local hotels.

"I think I had seven at one point," said **Beachside Village Resort** owner **Dave Gadsby**. He said the students ate in our restaurants, jogged along El Mar and even attended **Jazz on the Square**.

Gadsby thought UM's designs

were as good as any we could have gotten from highly-seasoned professionals. He said he liked the fact that UM focused on improving existing Town structures and hotels as opposed to recommending that buildings be torn down and rebuilt.

Gadsby said he got as much out of participating in the Design Charrette as he had attending any other meetings with planners in Town for the past 15 years.

"I thought it was fantastic," he said. "They had some good ideas."

**Windjammer Resort General Manager John Boutin** said the UM students looked at Lauderdale-By-The-Sea with "a fresh pair of eyes."

He said UM's report gives the Town "a canvas to start working on."

He said Fort Lauderdale and Pompano Beach are investing in their beachfront areas and that we need to move forward to remain an economically-viable community.

"We're going to be left behind if we don't start putting our eggs in one basket," Boutin said.

## UM design teams studied five important areas

The **University of Miami School of Architecture's Design Team** produced a detailed report with numerous plans and proposals for the five key areas they researched.

"What we got from these students will lead us into the future," said **Town resident Sandra Booth**.

**Charles Bohl**, the UM associate professor who headed up the team, said it was important for the Town not to try to do everything at once.

"Small steps," he suggested.

**Edmund Malkoon**, a resident who dropped by **Jarvis Hall** several times during the week UM was in Town, liked many of UM's final design proposals.

"I really think we can do the majority of them," he said. "We have a chance of getting things done this time. We have the money. We're not broke."

Resident **Ron Piersante**, who also visited Jarvis Hall numerous times during the workshop, said the Town cannot afford to put UM's designs and ideas on a shelf, as it did with previous economic reports.

### STUDY SITES

"The Town's got to do something," he said.

**Ken Brenner**, a Town resident, property owner and the owner of **Interior Digs** on Commercial Boulevard (one of the study areas), was also impressed with the final work produced by the students.

"I think in a very short time they got the flavor of our Town," he remarked. He then added: "I'd like to see something move forward."

UM's 155-page report was sent to **Redevelopment Management Associates**, our economic advisor. RMA, whose principals played a key role in the widely-heralded redevelopment of **Delray Beach** and **West Palm Beach**, is incorporating UM's designs into a 5-year implementation plan for the Town.

The UM design teams developed streetscape, landscape and park designs for **State Road A1A**, as well as hotel façade improvements.

UM observed that Commercial Boulevard has three distinct sections. The two easternmost blocks encompassing Pelican Square are lively and urban. The next two blocks have a downtown feel to them. The final blocks west to the **Intracoastal Waterway** have a mixed commercial makeup. UM recommend treating the three areas somewhat differently.


The students looked at five key Town areas. Here were some of their recommendations:

#### Commercial Boulevard

Relieve traffic congestion in and around Pelican Square area; create an identity for the marina on Basin Drive; encourage more pedestrian activity west of State Road A1A by adding shade trees, acquire empty lots to expand parking; promote the right mix of tenants. Develop a retail window film program for vacant storefronts; promote a unified brand

for various shopping areas. To help pedestrians, install crosswalks to connect opposite sides of the roadway.

**A1A Corridor**

Remove asphalt, add more trees and improve walking paths to make the street more pedestrian-friendly; develop a distinctive southern entranceway at the **Visitors Center**, making it more visible to drivers. Emphasize the streets from A1A that lead to our beach portals by adding more shade and removing some asphalt; improve street signage; provide covered bus stops with bicycle racks.

**Town Hall / El Prado**

UM developed three possible scenarios for this area, including selling the Town Hall site to offset the costs of re-locating government facilities elsewhere. The report said the Town could earn \$7.6 million selling Town Hall property to a developer for rental apartments. UM said the **El Prado Parking Lot** is a rare and ideal spot for a community park if parking can be re-located nearby; the existing **El Prado Park** could have an amphitheater with the ocean as its backdrop.

**Large Hotels / Small Hotels**

For the large hotels at the north and south ends of El Mar Drive, UM suggested new pools areas, a wellness garden and spa; outdoor dining patios, gardens for ground-level rooms, a usable roof garden and a garage. For small hotels on El Mar, UM recommended façade improvements, interior renovations and conglomerating adjacent hotel properties to reduce operating costs and share amenities.

In great detail, UM also analyzed the economic benefits for hoteliers if they made some of the suggested improvements to their properties in the future. □

**Paul Novak**, who owns the **High Noon Hotel** and serves on the **Lauderdale-By-The-Sea's Chamber of Commerce's Executive Board**, said the students were quick studies. "In a short period of time, they talked about the Town like they had lived here for 20 years," he said.

One of the design hurdles UM's multi-disciplinary teams faced was incorporating our 3-story height-limit.

"That was a huge challenge," said **Catie Sacks**, a grad student in UM's **Master of Real Estate Development+Urbanism Program**.

Sacks said the UM students had no preconceived ideas about the Town. "None of us had ever been here before," she said. "We looked at the Town from a distance."

Sacks said the UM teams focused on developing realistic designs that could be implemented.

"We didn't want to present something that's never going to happen," she said.

The student teams developed proposals (see related story on Page 7) for five areas in the Town's Master Plan: Commercial Boulevard, State Road A1A, Town Hall/El Prado, small hotels on A1A, and the large hotels at the two ends of **El Mar Drive**.

Many of the students were members of UM's MRED or **Master of Urban Design** programs. A few students were undergraduates. They not only developed practical and attractive designs, but included detailed cost estimates as well.

"It wasn't just a nice picture . . . there was analysis underneath it," Bohl said.

Hoffmann said she was impressed by the amount of detail contained in UM's work.

"Some of the work they did, particularly on A1A, is far more detailed than we expected and will be a blueprint for construction drawings," she said. □
